Directions: From the South take A1(M) northbound leaving at J4 after the Hatfield tunnel - at the roundabout after crossing over the motorway take the 1st exit (A6129 Stanborough), at the next roundabout 2nd exit (A6129 WGC) - keep on this over the next two roundabouts, signs will say Business and Industrial Area. At the next roundabout the road becomes A1000 and is Broadwater Road. After the traffic lights (straight over) at the intersection with B195 the name changes to Bessemer Road, there is one more roundabout before you enter the Mundells one-way system. As you approach the system, the right hand lane is marked other routes - take this lane and keep to the right as you start on the one-way system - at the next roundabout take the 3rd exit (Town Centre, Hertford) and almost immediately there are two adjacent entrances on the left the second of which is Mundells Court. Turn right along the front of the buildings which face onto the road, 4 is at the right hand end of these.

If on the one-way system you reach a turning off to B1000 Tewin you've gone too far! Complete the one-way circuit and try again!

From the North leave A1(M) at J6 head for WGC and A1000.

Why were Esther and Marcus in Salisbury?

The answer is that they had joined 13 other aspiring students for the Annual five-day Easter Course for Organists at Sarum College. This course has many exclusive facilities that make it very worthwhile - the organs, the location, the accommodation, the tutors, and the ambiance to name just five of them.

The organs used range from the Cathedral Father Willis/Harrison, through a Conacher and a William Hill, to the two small tracker-action practice instruments in the College.

The College is located in the peace and tranquility of the Cathedral Close, the accommodation is infortable, with excellent, super-abundant food.

Students of all ages and abilities are accepted: this year there were 8 in the A (for Advanced) group, including one from Spain and one from Queensland, Australia. There were 7 in the B group, including Esther and me.

The Tutors were Robert Fielding, (Course Director), Daniel Moult, Andrew Smith and Gordon Stewart. They were always able to give a convincing answer, and often a demonstration, to answer any question about fingering, footing, performance style, registration etc.

Most mornings and afternoons there were two tutor sessions for each group, separated by a refreshment break, a total of 14 in all. The lidents offered what they thought was a suitable piece for the organ concerned, and the Tutor chose those that were to play. The ensuing Master Class was unfailingly helpful and interesting. What could one want more than to be part of such a dedicated group, all helping each other with a common purpose?

Daniel Moult devoted one session to a very thorough account of his researches into *Performance Nerves and how to cope with them*. Several students also volunteered their experiences and thus we gained details of various systems, some of which work for some people, and some for others.

Gordon Stewart gave a Lecture/Recital to explain the construction, figuration and rhythms used by J S Bach in his famous Passacaglia in C minor. He used only an 8 ft stop on the College Chapel organ, so it was possible to hear clearly and to comprehend every demonstration of each point of this marvellously lucid presentation.

There were also extra delights in the Cathedral - Evensong every evening, a rehearsal for Compline, which the Course then sang at dusk in the Cathedral (with authentic Voluntaries played by Andrew Smith on their Snetzler Chamber organ) and a recital by Robert Fielding to show the glories of the Father Willis pipework.

A half-day excursion was made on Wednesday to Wells, (where Ray Willis was the local facilitator) to visit St Cuthbert's Church, the Cathedral Music School (for a Master Class with Rupert Gough on the new Peter Collins instrument there) and finally the Cathedral for Evensong. After this Rupert demonstrated the organ very thoroughly, and there was an opportunity for a few Students who were in the right place at the right time to play briefly.

It was good to get away from the normal domestic routine to this Centre of Excellence, and to be free to concentrate solely on music, worship and organs for five whole days. Everyone left refreshed, encouraged, full of new ideas, and determined to develop a better rapport with their listeners.

Hymn Workshop

The afternoon arranged by the Teachers' Forum on hymn playing and hymn preludes was led by Simon Williams at Trinity-at-Bowes Methodist Church on Saturday 5 April.

The opening hymn *O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness* tune *Was lebet*, was played by Kathy Westwood and verses 1 & 2 were sung by all present. The singing was accompanied with a bright registration and a clear tune. This was followed by *Laudate Dominum*.

Mark Harris played the *Old 100th* from A Marsden Thomas' *Organist's Hymnbook*. We were then entertained with Simon giving a demonstration of how a good organist walks with his knees together and playing with the in-

side edge of the feet. Kojo Hagan played the hymn May the mind of Christ my Saviour, tune St Leonard's, and experienced, for the first time, people singing while he played.

Simon talked about the length of playovers, and how, in general, the last note of the playover and the gap must be the same lengths as at the end of the verses.

Esther Dunstone played us a soothing and calm performance of Prelude on *Werde Munter* by Percy Whitlock. The tune is a Lutheran chorale, by J Schop, of about 1640. Margaret Carr then played a Prelude on *Stuttgart* by C H Trevor, Maureen Haydon played an early work of J S Bach - Prelude on *Nun ruhen alle Walder*, only the first line of the chorale is played in the piece.

The final piece of the afternoon was Prelude on *Rhosymedre* by Vaughan Williams, played by Rosemary Knight. This is based on the communion hymn *Author of life divine*, one can imagine this played by a string orchestra with a pizzicato double bass playing the pedal line. The manual parts waft around above the precise and musical pedal line.

We are most grateful for Simon's expertise in leading the workshop, and thank Joyce Beaumont for making all the arrangements with Trinity-at-Bowes.

St Saviour's, St Albans, 26 April

It is not often that the EDOA has the chance to visit a church containing two pipe organs, but this was the case for our visit to St Saviour's, one fine Saturday at the end of April. Even better (for those with previous memories of the place) was the pleasant surprise of seeing the inside again - but this time resplendent in its redecorated state.

The eight or so members who gathered at the church were given a warm welcome from the organist, Christopher Muhley, who with characteristic skill and enthusiasm demonstrated the range of sounds available from the two instruments (one at a time . . .). Later on those of us who wished to do so had the opportunity to try both instruments for themselves.

From the nave, the most obvious sign of musical activity is the 1989 Peter Collins 2-manual instrument belonging to the IOF (International Organ Festival). This, based on Andreas ideas, sits at the Silbermann's crossing (nowadays also adjacent to the choir stalls and the nave altar). From directly in front of the case the voicing can seem a little fierce, but the effect is helpfully mellowed from a listening position down the nave. The draw-stops jut out from the casework in a vertical column on either side of the keyboards; Chris described to us the challenges he faced at each service in organising registration changes for even a simple hymn, let alone anything more complicated. (Presumably the original Silbermann design assumed that the organist would have one or more assistants - and a vast west-end gallery to house them in).

The other (the original) instrument, housed on the north side of the chancel, is a 3-manual organ originally by Nicholson in 1898, but given a degree of treatment by several others, most recently Saxon Aldred. If one looks at the stop-list and compares it with the space available, there appears to be plenty of room for the comprehensive specification, but in fact the pipework is shoehorned into a restricted area so as to make room for a vestry to the east side, from which a passageway underneath the pipework leads into the north transept.

About the only advantage of this arrangement is that Chris can move unobtrusively from one is strument to the other if the need arises. However, this looks to be small compensation for the lack of any registration aids (or even a mirror) on either organ - truly a triumph of musicianship over ergonomics (or the lack thereof!).

Not having played the Peter Collins, I cannot comment on how it felt from the console, but the other console is typically comfortable in the relationship of the keyboards to the stops. The key action, however is rather heavy, even to someone accustomed to tracker action. Again, registration changes require dexterity and forward planning if they are not to interrupt the flow of the music.

Once everyone that wished to had played the instruments (or inspected their innards, as the case

may be) we said thank you and farewell to Christopher Muhley, and most of us were tempted by the thought of tea, which was kindly provided by Rosemary Knight at her home a few streets away. Good cakes, good company, and the cup that cheers:- a very good way to round off the afternoon.

Our thanks to Christopher Muhley, Jeremy Ewen and Rosemary Knight for their several contributions to the event.
