I hope that you have all had a good summer, despite the miserable weather!

Mine was filled by teaching on courses for Oundle and St Giles International Organ School/RSCM, and leading Harrow Choral

Society on a short concert tour to Brittany. During the last of these a particularly good lunch was nearly spoiled by our organist calling me from the church where we were later to perform to say that the organ was unusable and that the concert would have to be cancelled. In the event, a very nice Baroque organ with stubby pedals and at which the player sits in the west gallery looking at the *back* of the case did prove to be unsuitable for accompanying Rutter's Requiem, but we found an electronic organ (one manual, no pedals) in a vestry and used that, its rather rough sound mellowed by the church's generous acoustic. Is any instrumentalist expected to be more adaptable than an organist?

The idea of having an EDOA website looks to be a lot nearer now. If (when!) we have it, those of you who do not use the internet will still enjoy the same level of communication from the Association as at present, but its existence will open up new possibilities of disseminating information, not just to you the Members, but to a wider community both around Enfield and, of course, very much further afield.
