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An illustrated talk on Liturgical Organ Music: "Let the Organ Thunder?? Liturgical Organ Playing from 1600 – 2000"

Over twenty people gathered on Tuesday evening 17th September at St Andrew's Church, Enfield Town to hear Philip Norman give an hour's illustrated talk on liturgical organ playing. 'Let the Organ Thunder' was a brief guide through Western Europe over the past four centuries on how the organ was used in a liturgical context. From alternatim in French Kyries around the reign of the Sun King to present-day Germany where books are still sold that have preludes, inter-verse interludes and postludes to hymns used during the Service. Can you imagine that in an English church? Yet it's something that did happen up until the late nineteenth century, to a lesser extent. So why not today? One theory from Philip is that we simply ran out of organists skilled in the art of improvisation. Today, it's just intro with verses straight through (and possibly a last verse reharmonisation) and just maybe an outro 'to cover the action'. Some hymns already have their own mini preludes, inter-verse interludes and postludes, the best example being Parry's wonderful Jerusalem. Do we want a return to this art form while keeping to our one-hour Sunday Service? Only if it will reduce the length of the sermon!

This was the third time Philip Norman has given an illustrated talk to EDOA, and for me, the best yet. Do come to the next.
